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1. Blood Collection Zone, Blood Analysis Lab and DNA Analysis Lab




On the first day, I got the chance to visit the blood collection zone as well as the blood analysis lab. In the blood collection zone, I learnt how a blood sample is collected from a patient. I also became aware of the precautions and procedures of carrying out a blood collection.

In the blood analysis lab, I was very impressed with the automatic blood sampling system. I got to ask

questions about how the elaborate system works as well as to learn more about it and its development over the years. While in the lab, I got a better idea about how the doctors are able to provide patients with detailed diagnostics from analyzing anomalies in their blood samples.
